

#### A Note on the National Student Exchange and Domestic Programs

In 1996 OSU made the decision that culturally immersive programs outside of Oklahoma but within the USA were also meaningful to our students and should be included in our study abroad efforts. The National Student Exchange (NSE) program was moved into the Study Abroad Office at that time. This is why you will find not only NSE programs but domestic immersion programs within this report. Domestic programs are included as a part of our larger goal to increase the numbers of students participating in programs outside of Oklahoma as part of their experiential learning at OSU.

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#### **Executive Summary**

Similar to many peer institutions in 2016-2017, Oklahoma State University experienced a climate of geopolitical and economic uncertainty, as well as several well-documented security incidents abroad and in the United States, that affected student participation in global academic travel. OSU still had several notable achievements in this environment and student mobility remains a strong initiative for the University. Our goal with this report is to celebrate our campus successes and explore the continued challenges we face as an institution as we work to increase participation in a variety of meaningful academic experiences nationally and abroad.



Overall outbound student participation at OSU was down 7% in 2016-2017. However, we experienced an 18% increase in academic/calendar year program participation and several college-based, short-term travel courses saw their student participation increase as well. The decision to start the spring 2017 semester a week later had a significant effect on winter intersession course participation. As more colleges took advantage of the additional week to offer more course options, OSU experienced a 90% increase in participation with 116 students enrolling in a winter intersession travel course.

Inbound study abroad participation was down 28% in 2016-2017, with notable reductions in the number of international students participating in long-term student exchange. Several students cancelled planned exchanges to the United States during the 2016 national election. The unfavorable peso to dollar exchange rate reduced the historically strong number of Mexican students traveling to Oklahoma for study abroad as well. We expect these trends to continue for the coming year.

Oklahoma State set a goal in 2015 for 50% participation in study abroad by those graduating with an undergraduate degree from the University. With the implementation of the Terra Dotta program management software in 2015, we are nearing the point where longitudinal data will be available to precisely articulate our status in reaching this goal. Based on the student participation in recent years, we estimate 23% of the students receiving an undergraduate degree from OSU in 2016-2017 participated in a study abroad program.

With the restructuring of the Division of International Studies and Outreach into the School of Global Studies and Partnerships, continuing scholarship support across campus and increased interest for collaborative international programming, we look forward to 2017-2018 with anticipation for continued success.

- Increase participation in diverse educational opportunities across the USA and around the world
- Develop academically sound and cost effective programs that accommodate a wide range of disciplines and encourage language acquisition
- Provide support for students preparing to study away from OSU, and for those returning to campus, to encourage active contributions to the international awareness and programming on campus
- Encourage and facilitate the integration of incoming exchange students into OSU campus life
- Promote an atmosphere on campus and in the community that emphasizes high quality, sustained international engagement with scholars, professionals, and students

#### STUDY ABROAD and ACADEMIC TRAVEL

#### **FAST FACTS 2016-2017**

- Following a national trend within our current global, political and economic climate, OSU experienced a slight decrease in student participation in study away programs of 7% institution-wide and 2% for longer-term programs
- **\*** The average GPA for participants across all programs was **3.44**
- ✤ Approximately 23% of those receiving an undergraduate degree from OSU in 2016-2017 participated in a study away program
- Study abroad scholarships to 786 students exceeded \$920,000 a 5% decrease in funds awarded compared to 2015-2016
- The Spears School of Business continued to have the most participants on outbound programs with 435 students. Efforts in the College of Human Sciences and the Center for Health Sciences led to a 50% increase in participation on short-term travel courses in those colleges compared to 2015-2016.

#### Program Definitions:


**AFFILIATED/APPROVED PROGRAMS:** The Affiliated/Approved designation for a long-term Study Abroad Program indicates that the university has either signed an affiliation agreement with an intermediary organization or has approved the program for transfer credit at OSU. It includes many different models, including direct enrollment at a university abroad or study facilitated by a study abroad organization or another US university.

**NATIONAL STUDENT EXCHANGE:** The National Student Exchange is a domestic reciprocal exchange that involves over 200 universities and colleges in the U.S. and its territories, as well as several Canadian institutions. Students receive either OSU resident credit or transfer credit depending on the category in which they enroll at the host institution.

**RECIPROCAL EXCHANGE:** Reciprocal exchange involves the exchange of students in which tuition and fees are paid at the home university for study at the host university. Reciprocal exchanges usually involve a semester or an academic year. OSU students are enrolled at OSU while studying away and receive OSU resident credit for the work successfully completed abroad.

**COLLEGE-BASED ACADEMIC PROGRAMS:** Academic college courses are generally of short duration, two to four weeks, but can be longer. They are typically offered during winter or spring breaks and during the summer session. These courses are coordinated within each academic college at OSU and normally led by OSU faculty.







Note: Increasing men's participation in study abroad is a focus of national attention. OSU performs slightly better on male participation rates than the national average of 33%.





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#### **CASNR Programs: Student Participation by Region**





### **CEAT Programs: Student Participation by Region**


















#### **SGSP Programs: Student Participation by Region**









